The meeting defined three conditions for a celestial object to be called a planet: one, it must orbit the Sun; two, it should be massive enough to acquire an approximately spherical shape; three, it has to 'clear its orbit', that is, be the object that **\_\_\_ D \_\_\_ excerpts** the maximum gravitational pull within its orbit. Owing to this third property, if an object ventures close to a planet's orbit, it will either collide with it and be accreted, or be ejected out.
