**Rule:** An adverb is followed by (adjective + noun)

**E.g.:** A well designed model is to be presented in the meeting.

**Note:** Some adjectives are non-gradable as they describe absolute qualities such as **amazing, ancient, awful, boiling, delicious, enormous, excellent**, etc.

E.g. *This is the most amazing car. (Incorrect)*
