Figure of

Speech

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A figure of speech is an expression used to make a greater effect on a reader or listener. It includes making comparisons, contrasts, associations, exaggerations and constructions. It also gives a much clearer picture of what you are trying to convey.

Definition of a Figure of Speech
A figure of speech, according to
the Oxford Learner's Dictionary,
is defined as "a word or phrase
used in a different way from its
usual meaning in order to create
a particular mental picture or
effect." The Cambridge
Dictionary defines a figure of
speech as "an expression that
uses words to mean something
different from their ordinary
meaning" meaning.

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Simile Definition

A simile is a figure of speech in which two essentially dissimilar objects or concepts expressly compared with one another through the use of "like" or "as." Simile is used as a literary device to assert similarity with the help of like or as, which are language constructs that establish equivalency. A proper simile creates an explicit comparison between two things

Common Examples of Simile

Slept like a log
Sly as a fox
Fits like a glove
Cool as a cucumber
Blind as a bat
Light as a feather

Metaphor

A metaphor is used for implying a comparison between two things that have something in common but are in general different from each other. Some examples of the usage of metaphors in a sentence is as follows:

It is raining cats and dogs He is the star of our class Life is a highway. Her eves were diamonds.

Personification

Personification attributes human nature or human qualities to abstract or inanimate objects. For example, we often use the phrases like the howling wind, dancing leaves, time flies etc. Some examples of personification in a sentence are:

The opportunity knocked at his door

Alliteration

Alliteration is a sentence that consists of a series of words that have the same consonant sound at the beginning. Some popular examples of alliteration in a sentence include:

She sells sea shells on the seashore

Onomatopoeia

This is a figure of speech that is used to express a sound. To be more precise, it involves the use of words that imitate the sounds associated with the action or object referred to i.e. hiss, clap etc. Some examples of onomatopoeia include:

The buzzing bee flew over my head

Hyperbole

A hyperbole is a figure of speech that consists of an exaggeration. It is the usage of exaggerated terms in order to emphasize or heighten the effect of something. Some examples of using hyperboles in a sentence include:

I have told you a million times to not touch my stuff!
She has got a pea-sized brain i'm so hungry I could eat a horse.
