'Muslim girl above 15 years can marry'

High Court cites Muslim personal law



ARTICLE

The Punjab and Haryana High Court has **held** that a Muslim girl above 15 years of age is **competent** to enter into a **contract** of marriage with a person of her choice. Justice Jasjit Singh Bedi's **assertion** came during a **petition** filed by a Muslim couple, who fell in love and **solemnized** their marriage on June 6, 2022, as per Muslim **rites** and ceremonies. Both the petitioners in Punjab's Pathankot had **approached** the High Court seeking protection of life and liberty from the **respondents**, including family members. Pointing out that the marriage of a Muslim girl is governed by the Muslim personal law, Justice Singh stated, "...As per Article 195 from the book Principles of Mohammedan Law by Sir Din shah Fardunji Mulla, the petitioner No. 2 (girl) being over 16 years of age was competent to enter into a contract of marriage with a person of her choice.

ARTICLE

Petitioner No. 1 (boy) is stated to be more than 21 years of age. Thus, both the petitioners are of marriageable age as **envisaged** by the Muslim Personal Law.” In his order on June 13, Justice Singh, however, pointed out that the issue in the case was not **with regard to** the validity of the marriage but to address the **apprehension** raised by the petitioners of danger to their life and liberty at the hands of the **private respondents** and to provide them **protection**. He **directed** the Senior Superintendent of Police, Pathankot, to decide the **representation** of the petitioners and take necessary action as per law.

ARTICLE

Address apprehension

“...The court cannot shut its eyes to the fact that the apprehension of the petitioners needs to be addressed. Merely because the petitioners have got married against the wishes of their family members, they cannot possibly be **deprived of** the fundamental rights,” Justice Singh said.
