
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

Thanks so much.


- This is a simple sentence you can use to thank someone.
- To add detail, say:
- Thanks so much + for + [noun] / [-ing verb].
- For example:
- Thanks so much for the birthday money.
- Thanks so much for driving me home.



I really appreciate...

- You can also use this phrase to thank someone. For example, you might say:
- I really appreciate your help.

- Or you can combine #1 and #2:
- Thanks so much for cooking dinner. I really appreciate it.
- Thanks so much. I really appreciate your cooking dinner.



 Defence / Defense • Defense is standard in American English. • Defence is found mainly in British English.

- <u>E.g./I.e.</u>
- These two Latin abbreviations are often mixed up,
- but e.g. means "for example," while i.e. means "that is."

Flaunt/Flout

• Flaunt means to show off:

LOLA flaunted his stylish new outfit.

• Flout means to defy, especially in a way that shows scorn:

 ROXEN flouted the business-casual dress code by wearing a tiara and flip-flops. • Gray/Grey

• Gray is the standard American English spelling.

• Grey is the standard British English spelling.

- Loose/Lose
- Loose is usually an adjective:
- PINKU discovered that the cows were loose.

- Lose is always a verb. It means to misplace something or to be unvictorious in a game or contest:
- LOBU was careful not to lose his ticket.

Lead/Led

- Lead, when it rhymes with "bed," refers to a type of metal:
- PROMA wore a lead apron while the dentist X-rayed her teeth.

- Led is the past tense of the verb to lead, which means to guide or to be first:
- NASSU led the way.

Toward/Towards

• Toward is standard in American English.

• Towards is standard in British English.

Inquiry/Enquiry

• *Inquiry* and *enquiry* both mean "a request for information."

• Inquiry is the standard American English spelling. Enquiry is the British spelling.

• <u>Learned/Learnt</u>

- Learned is standard in American English.
- Learnt is standard in British English.

Historic/Historical

- Historic means famous, important, and influential:
- "the area's numerous historic sites

- GULLU visited the beach in Kitty Hawk where the Wright brothers made their historic first airplane flight.
- Historical means related to history:
- "historical evidence, "famous historical figures

• Than is used for comparisons:


KALU runs faster than PILLU.




