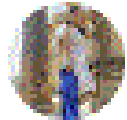

- If you will phone the manager now, he will surely make an appointment with you. (willingness)
- I would be very thankful if you would help me with my homework. (very polite request)

The words will and would are not usually used in the if part, except when they express willingness, for example, in requests (that is, when they carry a modal meaning)

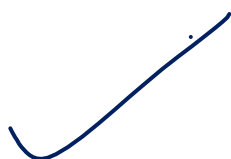

In Part C , This sentence has a problem with subject-verb agreement. The verb “makes” does not agree with the plural subject “noises.”

In Part C , This sentence uses a clunky progressive tense when it is not needed. Remove 'Being'

Solution : Option 3

In Part C , This sentence has a pronoun case error. Since Jenny and the speaker are objects (grammatically) within the sentence, the objective case pronoun ("me") is required, instead of the subjective case pronoun ("I").

Solution : Option 2

In Part B , The error here is "most thorough." Since "thorough" is followed by a verb it is an adverb, and thus must become "thoroughly." The correct way to write this would be "the most thoroughly researched."

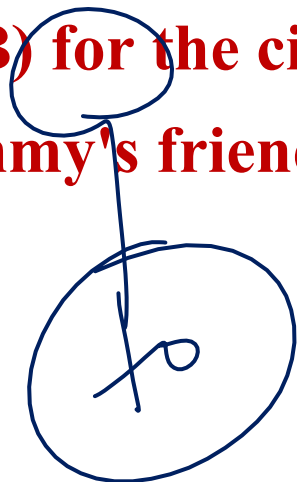

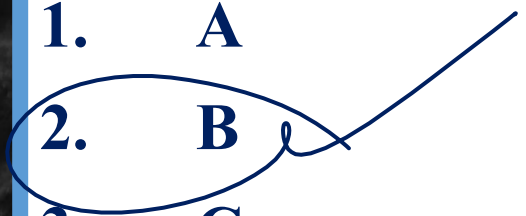
In Part B , The adjective “angry” should always be paired with either the preposition “with” or “at.” For example, “I’m angry with you for missing the appointment.”
