


A or An:

The choice between 'a' and 'an' is determined by sound.

> >	An:	Word beginning with a vowel sound.
> X	A:	word beginning with a consonant sound.
X	Ex:	an unhappy girl, a red apple

I do not want a gun in my house (any gun).
The gun is in his closet (implies there is a specific gun).
I am afraid of guns (all guns in general).



USE OF THE INDEFINITE ARTICLE

Rule 1:The plural form of a or an is some. Use some to indicate an unspecified, limited amount (but more than one).

an apple, some apples

Rule 2. Use a or an to indicate any non-specified member of a group or category.

- -That man is a scoundrel.
- We are looking for an apartment.

Rule 3. If a verb is being used as a noun in a sentence:

- She goes for <u>a walk</u> every evening.
- I had a long talk with him on the issue.

USAGE OF "THE"

Rule 1. Use the article the when a particular noun has already been mentioned previously.

I ate an oranage yesterday. The orange was juicy and delicious.

Rule 2. the when the noun refers to something or someone that is unique.
The Theory of Evolution
The Big Bang theory

Rule 3. Use the before superlatives and ordinal numbers.

- Raka is <u>the tallest</u> man in his society.
- She is the last bench girl.

Rule 4. When an adjective, phrase, or clause describing the noun clarifies its identity.

The boy sitting next to me raised his hand.

Thank you for the advice you gave me.

Rule 5: Do use the before the names of

- points on the globe (the Equator, the North Pole)
- mountain ranges (the Smoky Mountains, the Andes)
- island chains (the Florida Keys, the Pacific Islands)
- geographical areas (the East, the Midwest)
- rivers, seas, and oceans (the Krishna, the Atlantic Ocean, the Nile River)

Rule 6: Use *the* with countries that include the words "republic", "kingdom", or "states" in their names

My sister lives in United States . w
My sister lives in the United States . r
My brother lives in United Kingdom . w
My brother lives in the United
Kingdom .r

Rule 7: Before an adjective in the comparative degree, when the selection of one out of only two persons.

- Kelly is more beautiful of the two girls in the class. X
- Kelly is the more beautiful of the two girls in the class.

Rule 8: Before the proper names of certain well-known or scared books.

The Mahabharata, The Ramayana, The Gita, The Bible, The Quran

Rule 9: Before directions (north, south etc.) when these are used as nouns.

the north of India, the Middle East, the West Asia

Rule 10: Before the names of political parties. the BJP, the Congress



WHEN NOT TO USE "ARTICLE"

Do not use *the* with names of countries:

Germany is an important economic power.

Do not use the with the names of languages:

•French is spoken in France.

Do not use the with the names of meals:

- Lunch is my favourite meal.
- •I like to eat breakfast early.

Do not use article with proper nouns:


Jaka plays football

Do not use *the* with titles when combined with names:

- Prince Charles
- Queen Elizabeth
- President Clinton

Do not use *the* after the 's possessive case:

- ·His brother's car
- •Ram's car



Do not use article with uncountable nouns:


Certain food and drink items: bread, butter, cauliflower, celery, cereal, cheese, chicken, chocolate, coffee, corn, cream, fish, flour, fruit, ice

Certain nonfood substances: air, cement, coal, dirt, gasoline, gold, paper, petroleum, plastic, rain, silver, snow, soap, steel, wood, wool

Most abstract nouns: advice, anger, beauty, confidence, courage, employment, fun, happiness, health, honesty, information, intelligence, knowledge, love, poverty,truth, wealth



you are wearing very smart clothes for a special occasion.




