

Masquerade (noun)


Meaning: a false show or pretense.

Sentence: Her sorrow is just a masquerade.




Deleterious (adj.)

Meaning: causing harm or damage.


Synonyms: harmful, damaging, detrimental

particular place.


Synonyms: inhabitant, resident,
