Meaning : **a countless or extremely great number.**

Synonyms : multitude, a lot, a large number

Antonyms: finite, limited, countable

Sentence : We were plagued by myriad tiny flies.



Mawkish (adj.)

Sickening taste
Mandlin

Kitchy

Meaning : sentimental in a feeble or sickly way.

Synonyms : sentimental, oversentimental, overemotional

Antonyms : unsentimental, unadulterated, unvarnished

Sentence : The film lapses into mawkish sentimentality near the end.



Ambivalence (noun)

**Meaning : the state of having mixed feelings
or contradictory ideas about something or
someone.**

**Synonyms : equivocation, uncertainty,
unsureness**

**Sentence : The document expressed some
ambivalence over the doctrine of
predestination.**



Enunciated (adj.)

Meaning : say or pronounce clearly.

Synonyms : pronounce, articulate, say

Antonyms : inarticulate, mute, quiet

Sentence : He enunciated his theory to his
colleagues.

Masquerade (noun)

Meaning : **a false show or pretense.**

Synonyms : facade, deception, pose

Antonyms : candidness, candor,
directness

Sentence : Her sorrow is just a
masquerade.



Deleterious (adj.)

Meaning : **causing harm or damage.**

Synonyms: **harmful, damaging, detrimental**

Antonyms: **anodyne, benign, harmless**

noxious

harmful

Sentence : **These drugs have a proven deleterious effect on the nervous system.**



involved in something unpleasant

Enmeshed (verb)

Meaning : **cause to become entangled in something.**

Synonyms: **entangle, ensnare, snare**

Antonyms: **disentangled, untangled, liberated**

Sentence : **The whales are caught by being enmeshed in nets.**

She has become enmeshed in a tangle of drugs and petty crime



Aplomb (noun)

Meaning : **self-confidence or assurance, especially when in a demanding situation.**

Synonyms: **poise, self-assurance, self-possession**

Antonyms: **self-distrust, self-doubt, apprehension**

Sentence : **He delivered the speech with his usual aplomb.**

Denizen (noun)

Meaning : an inhabitant or occupant of a particular place.

Synonyms: inhabitant, resident, townsman

Antonyms: guest, tourist, visitor

Sentence : The denizens of Shantytown live in a natural way.
